The climber Gymnanthera oblonga at East Coast Park

Subject: Gymnanthera oblonga (Magnoliophyta: Apocynaceae).

Subject identified by: Contributor.

Location, date and time:

Singapore Island, East Coast Park, scrubland next to jogging track near Fort Road; 1 October 2012; 1220 hrs.

Habitat: Scrubland.

Observer: Contributor.

Observation: A small patch of *Gymnanthera oblonga* was seen climbing over several small shrubs growing next to the jogging track. Several opened seed pods were present, revealing feathery seeds (see photograph).

Remarks: Gymnanthera oblonga is a critically endangered climber in Singapore (Chong et al., 2009). This species is rarely seen as it is usually found in back mangroves or coastal forests; habitats that were largely lost to land development in Singapore.
